Their repetitive and melodic nature supports memory retention, pronunciation development, and listening comprehension, which are crucial components of ESP learning. Furthermore, songs create a low-anxiety learning environment—a condition emphasized in Krashen's Affective Filter Hypothesis—as learners engage with language in an enjoyable and emotionally supportive atmosphere. This is particularly important for ESP learners, who often encounter

discipline-specific terminology and complex linguistic structures that may pose additional cognitive challenges.

The role of songs extends beyond linguistic enrichment. They promote cultural awareness, stimulate multisensory interaction, and encourage collaborative learning, thereby contributing to the holistic development of communicative competence. As a result, songs serve not only as supplementary teaching materials but also as influential instructional strategies that align with modern principles of motivational and cognitive psychology.

Given these considerations, this paper aims to explore the pedagogical advantages of using songs in ESP education. It analyzes theoretical foundations, practical applications, and empirical insights to demonstrate how musical materials can effectively support the acquisition of specialized English. By highlighting their instructional potential, the study seeks to contribute to ongoing discussions about innovative methodologies in ESP teaching and to encourage educators to integrate songs more purposefully into their curricular practices.

Literature review. The use of songs in language teaching has been widely discussed in the field of applied

linguistics, particularly within the context of English as a Foreign Language (EFL) and English for Specific Purposes (ESP). Early studies highlight the inherent relationship between music and language acquisition, emphasizing the cognitive, affective, and social dimensions of musical engagement. Researchers such as Murphey (1992) argue that songs function as natural language input since they contain repetitive patterns, meaningful contexts, and authentic pronunciation models, all of which facilitate linguistic assimilation.

Krashen's Affective Filter Hypothesis (1982) provides a theoretical foundation for the pedagogical value of songs by suggesting that reduced anxiety and increased motivation significantly enhance language acquisition. Songs inherently provide an emotionally engaging environment, lowering psychological barriers that often hinder ESP learners, especially when dealing with specialized vocabulary and complex grammatical structures. Thus, songs serve not only as linguistic material but also as motivational and emotional stimuli.

Further research by Kuśnierek (2016) and Fonseca-Mora (2015) demonstrates that music plays a crucial role in developing phonological awareness, listening comprehension, and memory retention. These studies highlight that rhythmic and melodic elements support learners' ability to internalize pronunciation patterns and lexical units. Additionally, the multisensory nature of songs aligns with Gardner's Multiple Intelligences Theory (1993), which identifies music as a key modality capable of enhancing learning outcomes for students with diverse cognitive profiles.

In the context of ESP education, scholars underscore the importance of authenticity and relevance in instructional materials. According to Hutchinson and Waters (1987), ESP learners benefit most from input that reflects real-world communication within specific professional fields. Although songs may not always originate from technical or occupational contexts, their cultural, lexical, and emotional richness contributes significantly to learners' overall communicative competence. Studies by Baoan (2008) and Gubina (2017) further show that songs stimulate contextual learning, allowing students to link linguistic structures with real-life meanings and cultural backgrounds.

Moreover, research on cognitive processing indicates that music activates neural pathways associated with memory, attention, and pattern recognition (Patel, 2008). This neurological advantage translates into improved vocabulary acquisition and enhanced retention of specialized terminology in ESP settings. Empirical evidence suggests that learners exposed to music-based instruction demonstrate higher levels of engagement, comprehension, and willingness to participate compared to those taught through traditional methods.

Collectively, the reviewed literature affirms that songs offer substantial linguistic, psychological, and cognitive benefits in ESP education. While many studies focus on general EFL classrooms, the implications for ESP contexts are equally significant, warranting further exploration and practical application. The integration of songs into ESP pedagogy aligns with contemporary trends in learner-centered instruction and highlights the value of creative, multimodal teaching approaches in fostering meaningful language development.

Research methodology. This study employs a qualitative research design aimed at examining the pedagogical advantages of using songs in English for Specific Purposes (ESP) instruction. overall communicative competence, making them highly effective tools for ESP teaching.
